To donate money, checks may be written to <u>Jones County Community Food Bank</u> and mailed to 105 Broadway Place, Anamosa IA 52205. The ideal donation will enable a family to "make a meal," so items such as pasta and canned pasta sauce, canned tuna and/or chicken and/or beef, and Hamburger Helper items are great. Clients also like pancake mix and pancake syrup. Canned fruits or vegetables are great too. Personal care items are always welcome. Many people who don't use food stamps don't know that those on food stamps can't use that money for personal care items—only food. So, personal care items would be great — toothbrushes, toothpaste, toilet paper, facial tissue, tampons, diapers, etc. Giving is a great way of remembering our neighbors in need.

Calling All Poets and Pray-ers!

With the spring season quickly approaching, I want to invite any of you who are inspired to do so to submit haiku poems to me for sharing in the Pulse's HAIKU CORNER. This form of poetry originating in Japan is a short, unrhymed poem that adheres to a specific three-line, seventeen-syllable format: the first line is five syllables, the second is seven syllables, and the third is five syllables. Traditionally, haiku are about nature and frequently reflect the changing seasons. Often, a haiku focuses on a single moment in time and, in many cases, juxtaposes two images.
